Low Secure Service for Men with Personality Disorder

Cygnet Hospital Clifton, Nottingham

Cygnet Hospital Clifton is a 25 bed specialist low secure service for men with a personality disorder, who also present with complex mental health needs and challenging behaviours.

The treatment model we provide at Cygnet Hospital Clifton is delivered in the context of a cohesive multidisciplinary, psychologically informed team approach, with the service user at its centre. We aim to create opportunities for sustained positive behavioural change, by applying a consistent approach where the men in our care feel encouraged to develop positive interpersonal skills to reduce challenging behaviours.

The hospital is set out across two wards;

Ancaria Ward is the admissions/initial treatment ward, which focuses on rehabilitation, in preparation for moving on into the community or supported living. Ancaria Ward offers a defined pathway through to Acorn Ward.

Acorn Ward focusses on rehabilitation, to prepare for a move into the community or supported accomodation.

At Cygnet Hospital Clifton we aim to sequence interventions according to Professor Livesley's integrated treatment model. The therapeutic milieu aims to ensure consistency and optimal conditions for growth and change in a positive and effective environment.

Safety and Containment Crisis management Control and Regulation Emotional arousal

Prison Transfer Programme

We also offer a specialised three month prison transfer programme, for stabilisation and assessment of prisoners whose mental health needs cannot be met in the prison environment.

- Referrals and assessment: We provide a rapid response to referrals, assessment within the prison environment, quick decision on suitability for transfer within five working days and liaison with MOJ over transfer warrants
- Comprehensive inpatient assessment: Twelve week assessment programme including full diagnostic and risk formulations, IQ and neurological assessments, stabilisation, treatment plan

Psychology at Cygnet Hospital Clifton

The psychology department assess, treat and manage individuals with complex personality disorder and other mental health needs, who may have also experienced significant trauma. We provide a person centred approach to treatment and are passionate about working with individuals with personality disorder. The team offer:

- Psychological assessment; using psychometric assessments, clinical interviews and historical information
- > Formulation; shared and collaborative
- Intervention; formulation driven and evidence based
- Evaluation; we focus on the development and maintenance of a validating and empathetic positive therapeutic relationship throughout

Interventions are offered across individual and group sessions and comprise of a range of evidence based therapies, informed by:


- Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT)
- Dialectical Behaviour Therapy (DBT)
- > Schema Focused Therapy

Compassion Focused Therapy Additional interventions include:

- Psychoeducation relating to diagnoses
- > Substance misuse treatment
- > Trauma informed treatment
- Offence specific interventions that focus on offending behaviours such as violence, sexual offending and arson

Global Assessment of Progress (GAP)

The Global Assessment of Progress (GAP) is our specialist outcome tool used within Cygnet Hospital Clifton. The tool allows us to measure an individual's progress throughout their placement, plot the positive developments, setbacks and changes in wellbeing but also identify the warning signs of any possible deterioration, whilst informing care planning and being transparent about future risks.

Daily Living Skills Observation Scale (DLSOS)

DLSOS tracks functionality and the ability to successfully live an independent life in the community.

Daily Living Skillset

Average daily living skillset scores on admission and discharge. Service users are measured against 16 areas of function such as hygiene, budgeting and road safety.



HoNOS-secure

HoNOS-secure is a tool that tracks an individual's progress against the need for a secure setting (Scales A-G) and against a range of health and social domains (Scales 1-12).

It is about care planning and interventions. The ratings are based on the results of a clinical assessment, and can be used as a broad check for the multi-disciplinary care plan and risk management plan. A security scale rated at A or above indicates that a risk management intervention is needed, and for scales 1 to 12 a rating of 2 or above indicates that a care or treatment intervention is needed.

Security Scales (A-G)

- A. Risk of harm to adults or children
- B. Risk of self-harm
- C. Need for building security to prevent escape
- D. Need for a safely-staffed living environment
- E. Need for escort on leave
- Risk to individual from others


