


SCIENCE WEEK

British Science Week is a ten-day celebration of science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM). Here at the Phoenix School, we couldn't think of a better way to explore the miracle of science than by allowing our students to experience a ten day journey that started with fertile duck eggs and ended with four fluffy ducklings each with a personality all of their own.

Our eggs came from the Incredible Eggs Company who pride themselves on providing high welfare, ethical hatching kits to schools, nurseries and care homes. They strive to have a positive social and environmental impact and achieve this through education,



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animal welfare, safeguarding biodiversity, promoting and facilitating wildlife conservation and supporting a number of different charities and social enterprises.

On day one, our hatching kit was delivered - consisting of 5 fertile duck eggs, an incubator and a brooding cage. Eager to meet their new friends, each of our ducklings nibbled and pecked their way out of their shells before drying out in the heat of the incubator and enjoying a well-earned nap. Once their feathers had dried out, they were able to move into the brooding cage where they waited patiently for their siblings



to hatch. By the end of day 3, we had four happy, healthy, and undeniably adorable Indian runner ducklings.

Over the course of the ten days staff and students alike marvelled at how the ducklings grew and developed, some becoming cheeky and curious whilst others were more laid back choosing cuddles over mischief. We watched them take their first plunge into the water where some panicked and immediately sought dry land, whilst others dunked, dived and swam happily.



Our young people were encouraged to use the ducks as a basis for the CREST Bronze Award, run by the British Science Association and described as:

"Bronze Awards introduce students to project work empowering them to work like real scientists, technologists, engineers or mathematicians. Students

choose their own topic and methodologies, giving them complete freedom over their work."

Some of our young people chose to compare the rate of growth of each duckling (would the first born be the heaviest after 10 days?) whilst others compared the personality traits and preferences of them and how they developed. Our young people were also

able to complete AQA Unit Awards linked to hatching and caring for the ducklings.

Incredible Eggs describe ducklings as "A





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real 'confidence giver' to those unused to handling and caring for animals" and this could not have turned out to be truer! Some of our students expressed a love for animals, but a fear of accidentally hurting them. With a window of 10 days to build up their confidence, we saw these once wary young people become comfortable around holding and looking after the ducklings. The most wonderful part of the ten days was seeing the joy and serenity that nurturing the young ducks brought to our young people.

In the afternoon we had a special


lunch as requested by the Service Users followed by a quiz, paper flower origami and a discussion about who we all look towards as Inspirational Women.

Unicorn ward has some beautiful, and inclusive, new art work that has been painted by two young people on the ward – showing the whole team how much we value diversity!




CELEBRATE OUR AMAZING NURSES
