Harrow Health Care Worker Scoops National Award

A worker from Harrow who ensures patients at a mental health hospital receive the highest standards of care has scooped a national award in recognition of his dedication.

Will Anderson-White is the Operational Improvement Lead at Cygnet Hospital Harrow, on London Road, a mental health hospital for men and women. He won a Special Recognition award for his dedicated service at Cygnet Group's annual nursing awards.

The Cygnet Nursing Conference and Awards took place last week at the National Motorcycle Museum in Birmingham.

On receiving his award, Will, 31, said: "I like to think I have gone above and beyond and I always go where the need is. I try and remain positive in everything I do and make a good impact on services.

"Since being with Cygnet I feel that my voice is heard and I have a platform to really launch my career. People allow me to come with new ideas and that's been a launching pad for me. To win this award is really surprising but also marks an important point in my career. I'm really happy."
